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



From the President


As we approach our organization's 167th Annual Meeting, it is my pleasure to report that the Old Colony History Museum has never been more vibrant and optimistic.

The month of April 2020 marks the successful completion of an ambitious, far-reaching strategic plan that has modernized our museum, transformed its programming and established the OCHM as an essential community resource.

The year just ending saw the complete restoration of the upstairs exhibit hall, and that has enabled us to significantly improve the quality of our visitor experience. In accordance with modern museum practice, our tours are now self-guided, and our guests are invited to join in daily Highlight Tours. These are led by our curator, Bronson Michaud, who deserves special credit for the enthusiasm he brings to work each day. The dramatic upstairs renovation effectively complements the first-floor space that was redesigned in 2018, and work on the building's second floor will continue as the Military Room is scheduled for modernization in the coming year.

Offering worthwhile programming is a perpetual challenge for every museum, and the ongoing physical renovation of our building has allowed us to expand both the diversity and the quality of what we are able to present to our members. Over the past year, our hall has featured something for everyone, from scholars presenting their latest historical research to the folk singers and poets who visit for the regular Arts & Humanities programs. We have similarly enjoyed the success of the After Hours events, and this year's February Flicks saw the best attendance yet. Saria Sweeney, the OCHM's community program coordinator, leaves no stone unturned in the search for diverse, interesting events and activities.

Since my last report to the membership, and in addition to Saria's efforts, the museum's outreach program has continued to grow, especially in several areas of student involvement. My favorite memory of the past year is the temporary exhibit on Taunton and D-Day, curated and mounted by the students in the U.S. History Advanced Placement class at Taunton High School. I am happy to report that this relationship will continue, as this year's class plans another temporary exhibit to be opened in June 2020. We encourage this type of creativity and we look forward to more such endeavors in the future.








2019 marked another fantastic year filled with exciting challenges and wonderful results. Far and away the biggest project in 2019 was the exhibit hall re-model. A new ceiling, object safe lighting, UV shades, new display cases, large scale graphics and a new interactive now allow visitors to view and engage with the collection in a whole new way.

The main room on the second floor is now broken up into 5 sections covering over 400 years of local history: Settlement, Immigration, Industry, Transportation, and Fashion. Looking ahead, we still have two more rooms to modernize in the exhibit space and I am encouraged by the response to the work we completed this year.

We were also able to bring technology into the museum with interactive labels on both floors. Our talented docents learned a new highlight tour, which we offer daily at noon. In 2020 we have plans to unite all of the spaces in the building, with the development of an audio guide. We'll be sure to keep you updated and look forward to its debut.




2019 ACQUISITIONS

2019 CONSERVATION PROJECTS

In 2019 we continued to implement improvements to the building and collections storage based on reports submitted by Image Permanence Institute in 2017 and Conservation Specialist Lisa Goldberg in 2018. We added more LED light fixtures and UV shades to public spaces to improve lighting quality and safety. We replaced all of our small, residential dehumidifiers with a large industrial-grade dehumidifier to regulate humidity in our collection storage, which has already shown a huge improvement. Lastly, we continue to monitor the collection spaces and maintain the pieces as needed.

Looking ahead for 2020, plans are in place to increase the range of fire detection coverage in both public and collection storage areas, install improved access to our attic, modernize our security system, change over our remaining oil boiler to natural gas, and install improved shelving units in our storage areas.

We have been able to take on these projects through generous support of The Ruby W. and LaVon P. Linn Foundation for which we are extremely thankful.

2019 EXHIBITIONS

In our dedicated first-floor exhibition space we opened two new exhibitions this year, which you can see below. This space is a literal white box, and we wanted it to be that way so that each new group that we work with can transform it in their own unique way. Moving forward our staff will curate this space at times, and sometimes it will be a partnership with members of our community. Do you have a great collection you'd like to share for a few months? Programs and Education

In 2019 we organized 25 unique programs for the community which included participation in national and state-wide initiatives offering free access to arts and culture. We learned new skills in our Wednesday Workshops, made new friends at our pizza tasting competition, and at the Great Taunton Baking Competition--thank you to judges Lyndsey Littlefield (Miss Taunton 2019) and Arthur Battistini of Battistini's Bakery.

We worked with awesome community partners throughout the year who taught our workshops, welcomed us for a tour of Westport Rivers Vineyard, and shared a mobile escape game for our Haunted History After Hours in October. Our biggest day each year is the Liberty & Union Festival and we were thrilled to host our biggest crowds with the most entertainment ever!

We also hosted six lectures in the fall, with topics ranging from the lives of Duxbury's incredible seafaring women to gravestone carvers of the region, and military history from the Civil War to World War II. Most of these lectures, as well as our downtown walking tour were recorded by TCAM so that you can enjoy them from home! I hope you got to join in the fun for one (or more) of these programs, and that we see you again in 2020!

EDUCATION

Education had a major role at the Museum in 2019. In addition to revamping the museum exploration field trip for 7th graders, we were able to expand our reach even further by adding an in-school program for second graders called *Immigration Nation* where students learn about various ethnic groups who have made Taunton home. We begin with the English settlers first arriving in the 1600s and share the struggles and successes of our Irish, Portuguese, Italian, Polish, and Cape Verdean communities through the 1900s. Teachers have repeatedly expressed how happy they were that their students got to learn about our local immigration history and exposure to these cultures in an engaging, fun, and age-appropriate way. We also hosted Boy Scouts from Massachusetts and Rhode Island during Scout Week in April where 30 Scouts were able to earn their American Heritage badge here at the OCHM. We offer our sincere thanks to the charitable foundations of Rockland Trust and Bristol County Savings Banks whose support makes these field trips possible for our local students.

After the end of the academic school year the teachers became the students this past June for a Professional Development workshop focused on Taunton's colonial past. They (and I) gained a tremendous amount of knowledge from Dr. Hanna through presentations within the Museum, getting a peek at some rarely-seen objects and access to primary sources from the collection, as well as walking tours throughout the city. Our goal is to share what we have here at the museum as widely as possible, and hope these workshops help make it easier to bring local history into the classroom. Whether students, teachers, or the general public, we look forward to encouraging a love of history even more in 2020 and beyond!



PROGRAMS & EVENTS

The guiding principal in our programming is the idea of "audience." We have developed an active calendar in which we hope to offer something to everyone in our community. From movie showings and lectures, to hands-on workshops and walking tours we strive to offer you something new to try just as often as we plan an old favorite. The results have shown an increase in our audience year-over-year with 5,031 participating with us in some way in 2019. While we grow, we remain committed to offering quality, informative programs and experiences that connect the public more fully to all that Greater Taunton has to offer.




A THANK YOU



While serving on the Taunton Historic District Commission, she revised and edited the second edition (1986) of *Taunton Architecture: A Reflection of the City's History*. The success the Museum now enjoys stands upon the solid foundation Lisa built, and we will be forever grateful for her efforts. More importantly, she was a good and caring person; a devoted wife and mother, and a dear friend. She will be deeply missed and remembered fondly.



2019 Financial Summary



"Sustainability and growth are the hallmarks of what we strive to achieve. All while sharing the importance of our local history with as many people as possible."

Detailed in the following pages is the financial position of the Old Colony History Museum for the year ended December 31, 2019. It remains our pleasure to report to you a successful year as well as optimism for the future as we implemented new opportunities for growth throughout 2019.

The figures show that in 2019 we spent much of the cash we had been holding for the remodel of our second floor. We view this as an investment in the building itself as well as the organization,

which is shown in the increase Building Improvements figure. The main reason for the increase in our overall position is a strong return on our invested assets, which are managed by Rockland Trust. One note for readers of past annual reports, we have reclassified a few accounts to be "permanently restricted," slightly adjusting previously reported figures for 2017 and 2018.

The endowment funds nearly the entire expense of maintaining our staff, but as you can see that means that all other sources of income must be earned to allow for maintenance of building, programming, new exhibits, as well as the basics of heating and lighting our building. We must continue to grow in the areas of admissions, rentals, research, grant funds, memberships, and gift shop sales in order to ensure our continued growth.

As always, accounting standards do not permit us to record the value of our collection, but it is our most important "asset." In addition to our annual budget, in 2019 we were fortunate enough to receive a \$125,000 grant from the Ruby W. and LaVon P. Linn Foundation. These funds are restricted for capital improvements to our historic building and will be expended in the coming year. Finally, it should be noted that figures from 2017 and 2018 are from our accountants' reporting, but figures from 2019 are, as of yet, unaudited.




